How to Create a Training Course in PowerPoint



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eLearning with PowerPoint: Hot or Not?

We've all been there – trying to stay awake during tedious presentations awash with bullet points and stock images. No wonder some people think PPT is always boring. But think of a hammer, for instance. Does the fact that a hammer is a simple tool and everyone can use it make any less useful?

Like a hammer, PowerPoint is a tool. Whether your course will be useful depends not only on the software you use, but the degree to which your content is thought out and relevant to your learners. You might as well have been drawing pictures in the sand with a stick, as it doesn't really matter what tool you're going to use for authoring, at least, up to a certain point.

The important question is, why are you going to use PowerPoint?
Some reasons could be:

- You want to develop content yourself, so you need a simple and familiar interface.
- You need to create content very quickly (again, with PPT, there's no need for most people to spend a lot of time learning its functions).
- You need a free authoring tool (the cost of a Microsoft license is super affordable, and you probably already have one).

Depending on your reasons, there can be two approaches to authoring with PowerPoint. One is longer and a bit more hands-on, but free. The other involves using iSpring Suite AI, an intuitive AI-enhanced authoring toolkit that's a PowerPoint add-in.

We'll compare both approaches, so you can decide which one fits your course creation needs better

5 Steps to Create a Training Course in PowerPoint

Course development is a complex process that starts way before you open PowerPoint to create slides. You should determine your training needs and goals, research your audience, and select an instructional design model that will work best for your case.

Step 1: Make a course outline

After you've gathered all the necessary information for your online course, it's time to plot it, or in other words, create a general plan of the course that structures the information in a didactic order.

Divide your course into its respective topics (they will be [training modules](#)). If you're planning to create a lengthy course, break more general topics into subtopics and arrange them all in a logical order.

Example of structuring a topical outline:

Module 1

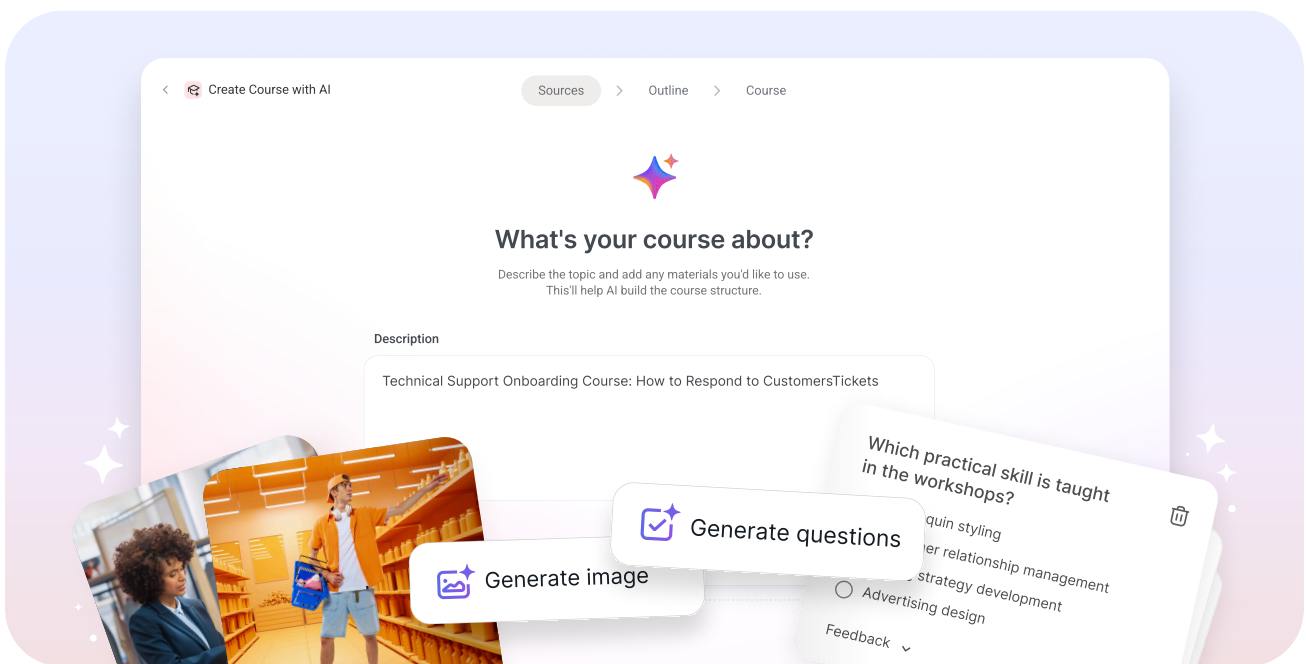
- ▶ Subtopic

Pro tip:

If you already have source materials, you can speed up this step with iSpring Suite AI. 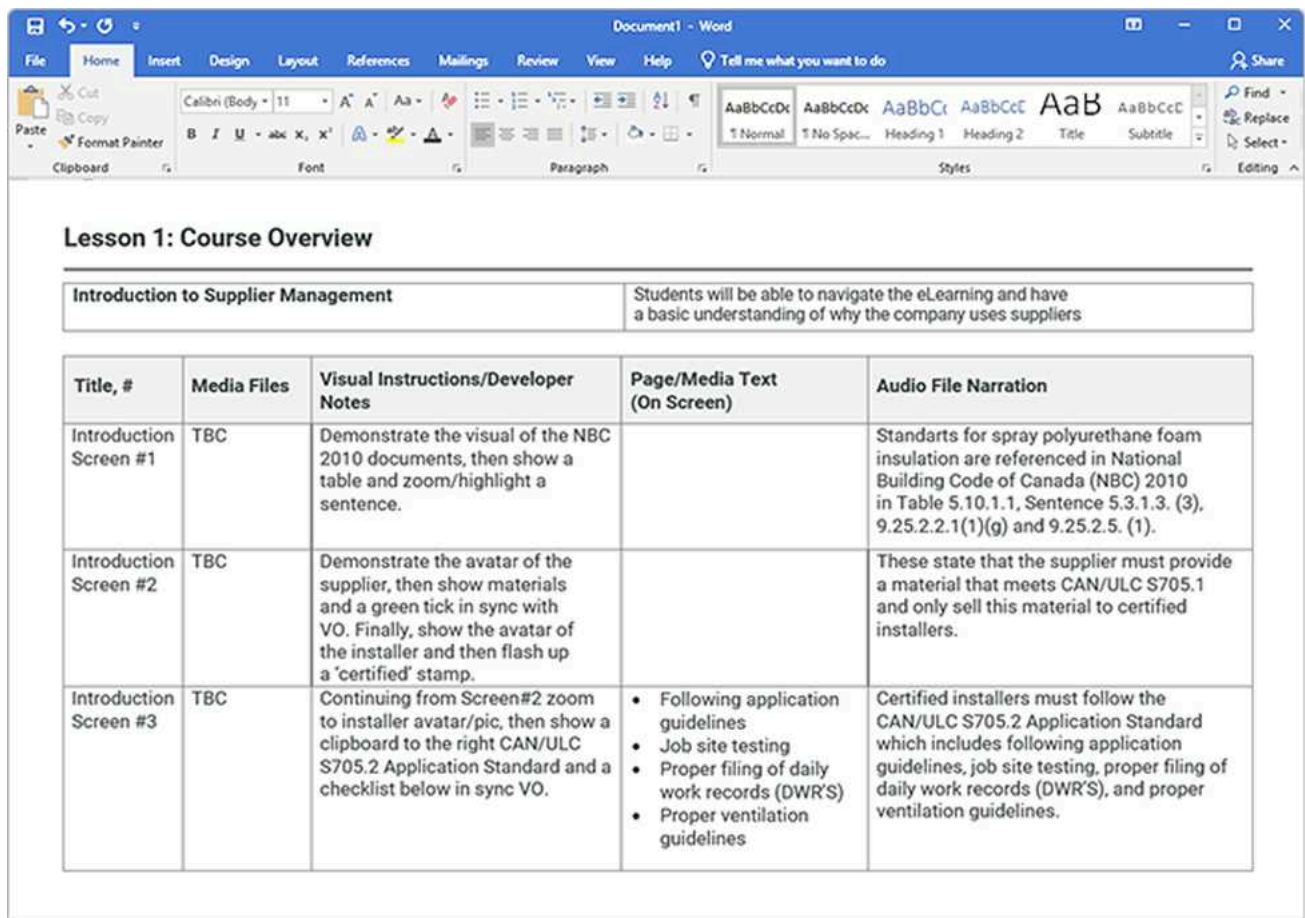


Step 2: Create a course storyboard

Now that you've divided your course into training modules and subtopics, you need to lay out the framework of the course in a visual manner. This is called storyboarding. A course storyboard can be created in a document, slide deck, prototype, or whichever way you prefer.

In addition to the written content (we'll discuss that in detail in the next step), it includes all the information in terms of photos, icons, charts, infographics, animations, or videos that will be used in the course. By the way, at this stage, it's important not only to think of what media you'll use but also to prepare all the necessary assets.

This is what can be included in an eLearning storyboard:

- Slide title/name
- Screen text and elements (see next step)
- Graphics and animation
- Navigation
- Branching
- Audio narration script

There's no one-size-fits-all solution, but there are some industry-standard methods for storyboarding that you can use as your foundation and adapt as required. To streamline the process, you can download the ready-made [PowerPoint](#) or [Word storyboard template](#) and customize them as desired.

Step 3: Write texts for each slide

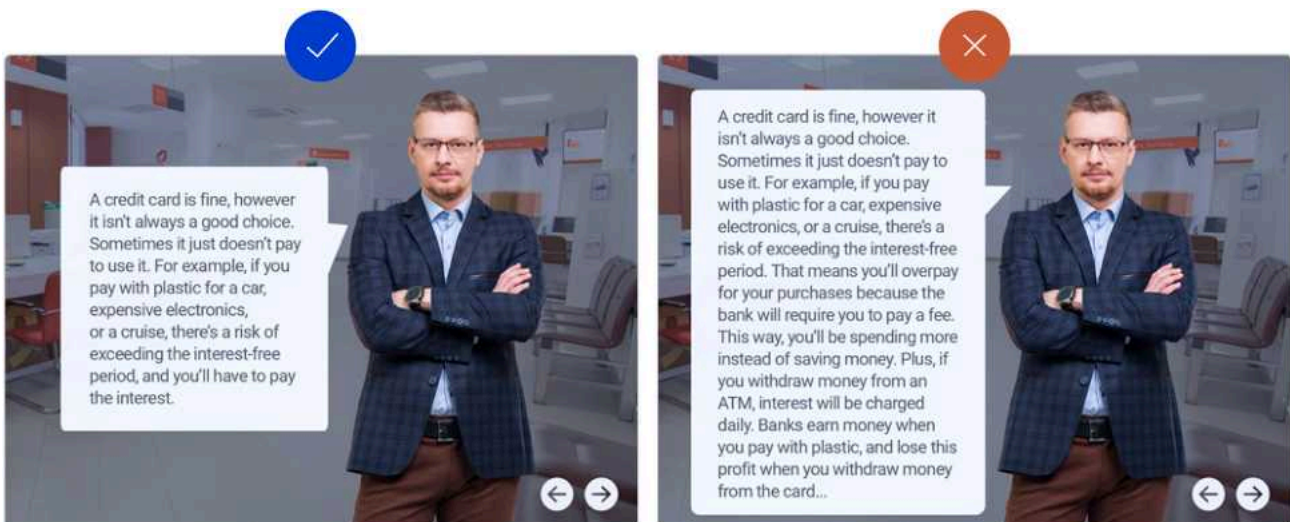
Now that you understand how your online course will be structured, you need to write a script. When prepared correctly, a script serves as the backbone of your eLearning course design and transforms the subject matter into engaging content.

Very often, an eLearning developer has to deal with two types of texts: an on-screen text and a narration script. Since there are different practices for writing them, let's have a look at each of these types separately.

On-screen text

Here, we mean all the text a learner will see on the slides. To make it really helpful, you need to consider the following things:

- **Add only core concepts to the slides.** If you want to provide some additional information, you might record a voice-over or support the text with images, infographics, and videos.
- **Minimize the text on a slide.** Eyes glaze over when they see large blocks of text, so try to make it as short as possible. Remove unnecessary words and break long sentences down into shorter ones; a line should have a maximum of 40 characters. The main rule here is one screen, one idea.



- **Make sure the content looks good on small screens.** The text, as well as other content items, must be visible, whether a course is viewed on a tablet or a smartphone. Keep this in mind when creating a course and check to see how it looks on a smartphone at the end of the eLearning development process.

Narration script

Creating a narration script is about writing a text for learners to hear, not read. You may skip this step if you're not going to include a voice-over in your course.

If you're planning to add narration, your primary task is to make a script that is listener friendly. To do this, you need to turn it into a conversation. Your learners should feel like they're dealing with an actual person. So write a script that has a conversational tone, without complex sentences or a lot of acronyms and jargon.

You can use contractions, transitional phrases like "now that we...", "let's examine...", or "let's shift gears...", and even slang.

After your script is ready, read it aloud. You may find that you need to replace or remove some phrases to make the speech smooth and clear. If so, make any necessary touch-ups.

You can also check the text for readability in the free Hemingway App. It will help you find lengthy complex sentences, passive voice constructions, and phrases that have simpler alternatives.

When you're building a course, writing clear, learner-focused text can take time. You need to decide what information belongs on the slide, what should be explained through narration, and how much detail learners actually need at each point.

iSpring Suite AI can help you revise existing text rather than rewrite it. You can use it to shorten long explanations, simplify complex language, summarize sections, adjust tone, correct spelling and grammar, or adapt content for a specific audience.

This can save time when you're working with documents such as manuals, policies, procedures, reports, or SME notes. Instead of editing everything manually, you can create a clearer draft and then focus on how the information should be presented in the course.

If you're writing narration, AI can also help refine the script so it sounds more natural when spoken aloud. Once the script is ready, you can convert it to audio with AI text-to-speech or use it as the basis for a short avatar video.

Step 4: Build slides

Now that you have prepared all the resources, it's time to assemble them and build your training course. The slides you need to create can be divided into three main categories:

- Informative slides
- Knowledge checks
- Engaging content

Let's delve deeper into each of these categories and see how you can create the necessary slides using PowerPoint and iSpring Suite.

1. Informative slides

Informative slides are the backbone of your training course. After all, this is what people open your course for – to gain new knowledge.

With PowerPoint:

PowerPoint is quite flexible when creating informative slides. You can select a slide layout that best suits your topic, fill it with text and images, add narration (if you convert your presentation into a video), a web page, a YouTube video, etc. You only need to determine which way to present new knowledge will be most effective for your audience.

With iSpring Suite:

iSpring Suite takes informative slides further and makes them interactive. There are 14 ready-made interaction templates, such as timelines, diagrams, graphics, catalogs, and FAQs. They'll help you make the training experience much more dynamic, illustrative, and effective.

For example, instead of creating multiple slides that describe various parts of a vacuum cleaner, you can create a single interaction where your learners click on each part to see its description.

2. Knowledge checks

Tests and quizzes are integral parts of any learning content.

Unfortunately, there's no feature in PowerPoint that allows you to create an assessment. But whether this fact creates a problem or not depends on your goal.

With PowerPoint:

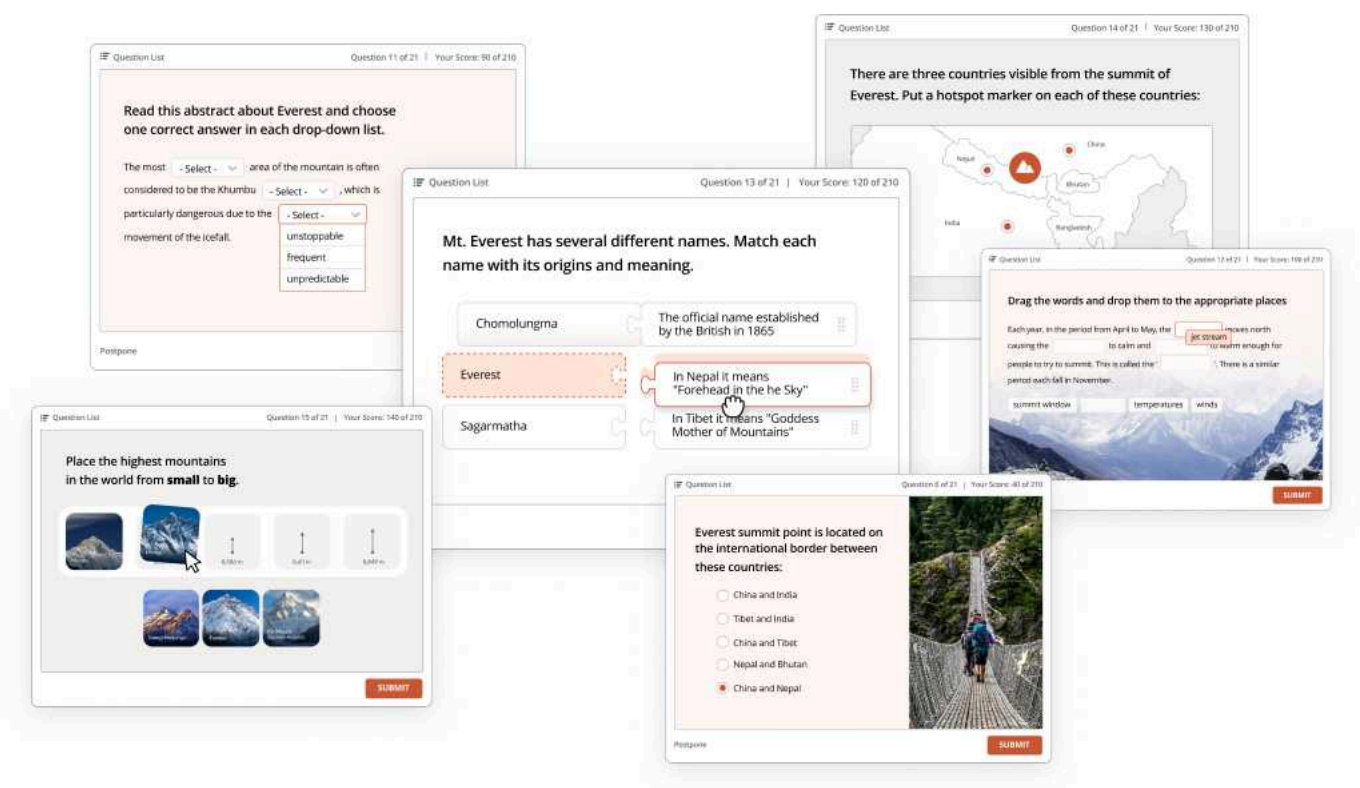
If you want to add a knowledge check simply for the additional engagement of learners and a self-check, then a combo of triggered animations and hyperlinks can be a workaround (a bit tricky and time-consuming, though). Check out these examples:

3. Engaging content

Finally, you need to make sure that your training course is engaging, since it's your best shot to ensure high completion and knowledge retention rates.

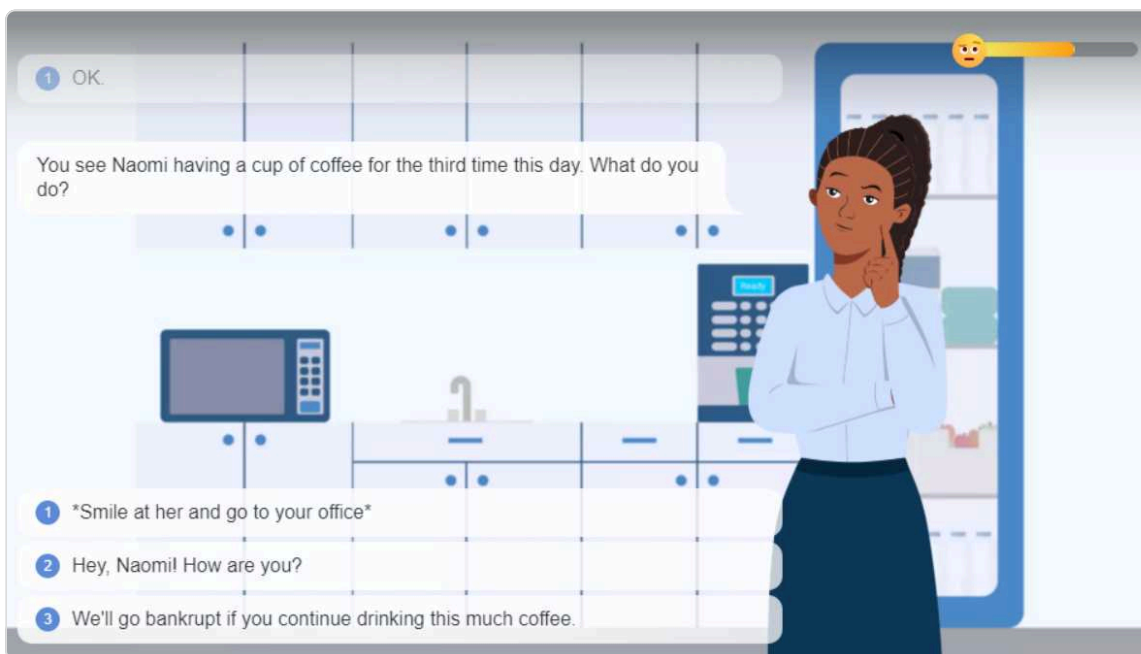
With PowerPoint:

Step 5: Turn PPT into eLearning

So, we now have a great-looking PowerPoint presentation. What's next? How can we turn a presentation into an actual eLearning lesson?

The answer to this question depends on how you plan to distribute the content. You can leave your PPT file as it is if you:

- Didn't use complex animations and interactions.
- Don't need to track statistics.
- Don't plan to publish the presentation to an LMS.

Simply upload it to a file-sharing service such as Google Drive, Dropbox, or SlideShare and send the link to your learners.

Otherwise, you'll need to publish the content in one of two eLearning formats: HTML5 (if you want your content to display equally well on desktops and mobile devices) or SCORM (if you're going to upload it to a learning management system).

You can convert your PPT presentation to one of these formats (and others, like xAPI and MP4) using iSpring Suite. Simply open your presentation in iSpring Suite, click Publish, select the destination (your computer, an LMS, YouTube, or iSpring Space), select the format you want and that's it – your presentation is now an online training course!

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Tips and Tricks

Tip 1: Set navigation

Unlike presentations, eLearning is a self-paced activity. Offer your employees some user control when engaging with your content. Not only does this give them a sense of agency, but it also suits their learning styles better when they have unfettered access to the material.

With PowerPoint:

Employ a few main slides and then allow the learner to choose where to go next by providing them with hyperlinks to various sections of the course. For example, in this [how-to on making a Jeopardy game in PowerPoint](#), the main slide is a game board where each cell is a hyperlink to the respective clue.

With iSpring Suite:

There's a special menu where you can set up properties for each slide and create advanced nonlinear navigation for the course. With its help, you'll be able to develop a branched scenario course in a couple of clicks and, for example, offer learners different levels of difficulty within a course or just let them choose the order in which they'd like to study topics.

Tip 2: Avoid clip art

You know that white 3D clip art guy that appears in, like, every PowerPoint presentation ever? Sometimes, he has punctuation marks over his head. An exclamation point, perhaps? Maybe a question mark if he's confused? Yeah, him. Do not use him.

With PowerPoint:

If you want your employees to use your e-course to learn, you should not signal to them that they can skim, and that is exactly what horrible clip art does: it triggers a yawn.

Use only meaningful and professional-looking images in your courses. There are many templates on the web that can be used in your projects free of charge. Have a look at these clip art alternatives and explore some of these resources:

Tip 3: Consider alternatives for bullets

What do you associate bullet points with? College lectures, business meetings, stuff you don't want to learn but have to anyway because somebody said so? Bullet points rarely present information in the most engaging format, and are likely to be scanned.

With PowerPoint:

Try another format for sharing quick facts. Simply putting fewer words on a slide would work, as would a chart or an infographic that conveys the same message.
